

The KU Natural History Museum's *Paleo Pop-Up Mobile Museum* webpage was created with Adobe Spark. This platform does not support alt text (alternative text). Therefore, screen-reading tools cannot describe images on the page. In lieu of alt text on the webpage, image and video descriptions are outlined below. The outline follows the order of the webpage as you scroll from the top to the bottom.

Note: although graphics on the webpage are clickable to make them appear bigger, all descriptions for graphics are of the graphics as they appear on the webpage.

- Introduction

- Video description: The next section of the webpage invites participants to learn about the KU Natural History Museum's mobile museum.
